Message from Chief Carani

Mayor Weppler, Village Trustees, Libertyville and Rockland Fire District Trustees, Village Administrator Kelly Amidei and the entire Libertyville Fire Department community; on behalf of all the members of the Libertyville Fire Department, I am proud to present our first Annual Report.



In 2018, the Libertyville Fire Department was a busy place completing a number of projects and responding to a record number of emergency calls for service. In our Emergency Services Division, all training records were updated to be in compliance with the Insurance Services Office (ISO) and the Illinois State Fire Marshal's mandated changes. The Department is participating in the Lake County 911 Regional Dispatch Consolidation Group in an effort to develop a plan to consolidate dispatch services in Lake County. In our Support Division, vehicle inventories were completed for all fire apparatus. A new fire engine and ambulance were delivered and put in service. In our Administrative Division, the process to evaluate our records management system was started in tandem with the 911 consolidation effort. Fire Officer Development continued focusing on Incident Command training and policy & procedure review. A comprehensive review of our internal policies was completed by our intergovernmental insurance cooperative, IRMA; the Fire Department received a score of 99%. In our Fire Prevention Division, we continue to educate children in our Risk Watch Program which now encompasses every grade school in the Village and Fire District.

In October, the Fire Department started providing fire and emergency medical services to Knollwood after a joint agreement with the City of Lake Forest and the Rockland Fire Protection District (RFPD) was completed. This completed a three year effort to complete an agreement with the RFPD. This agreement provides Knollwood with Libertyville and Lake Forest fire department services and allows each department to back each other up when the need occurs. The agreement also resulted in an additional \$125,000 of revenue to the Village with no increase in staffing needs.

The Fire Department was an Assistance to Firefighter Grant recipient in 2018 for \$58,582 to update and maintain our station vehicle exhaust systems. The Fire Department has been very fortunate and successful in securing grant funding which has helped defer the cost of many capital expenditures.

It is a privilege to serve the residents of Libertyville and the surrounding Fire Protection Districts. I want to thank the members of the Libertyville Fire Department for their dedicated service and professionalism. The ability to provide the highest quality of service to our residents is a reflection of their compassion, dedication, and respect. I would also like to thank the Mayor, Trustees, and Village Administrator for their support and assistance throughout the year.


Fire Station #1 (Headquarters)

Fire Prevention Bureau

The Fire Prevention Bureau (FPB) is staffed by one Assistant Fire Chief/Fire Marshal and one part-time civilian fire inspector. The FPB is responsible for all Fire Prevention activities in the Village of Libertyville and Libertyville Fire Protection District (LFPD). The LFPD services the Village of Green Oaks, parts of Mettawa, and areas of unincorporated Lake County. The FPB is responsible for fire inspections, plan reviews, testing of life safety systems, fire investigations, and public education. Libertyville Fire has 2,159 inspectable properties. These are broken down into semi-annual, annual, and 18 month inspections. These were accomplished utilizing the three shifts and day personnel.






FIRE LINE DO NOT CROSS

The fire department is tasked with investigating all structure fires in its jurisdiction. In 2018, 11 investigations were completed on both structure and vehicle fires. In 2018, between one and four investigators were used at each incident with 62.75 total investigation hours. Fire department investigators responded mutual aid to three structure fires outside the department's jurisdiction totaling an additional 14 investigation hours. The Fire Department utilizes four personnel for investigations, the two members of the FPB, and two firefighters from shift.

Public Education

The Fire Prevention Bureau's primary mission is to coordinate a range of programs and activities geared toward adults and children of all ages throughout the year.

Our goal is to educate the public. Ultimately, that is what community risk reduction programs are all about—protecting those we serve.



Public education is accomplished utilizing both shift and day personnel. Risk Watch is an example which is performed in several schools, both in the Village and District.




Fire extinguisher classes, tours, lunch in the park, and open house are some other examples of the types of classes/events performed by the members of the fire department.

Training Division

Calendar year 2018 has seen significant strategical development in the Department's training management system (Target Solutions). Target Solutions has become an outstanding administrative platform for managing daily training activities and is an overall comprehensive data collection point. Scheduling events, documenting and monitoring individual assignment progress, report generation, and information distribution



are all completed using Target Solutions. For years, the Libertyville Fire Department has conducted extensive training in all emergencies and regulatory compliance education. Categorizing and analyzing this data in a logical format for individual credentialing and organizational performance has been challenging. Target Solutions has been instrumental in resolving these challenges.



Training Division (cont)

Libertyville Fire Department has always recognized training as a very important and challenging responsibility. In 2016, the training division assigned one Lieutenant to manage each of the three shifts for consistency in training and development of training criteria. These Lieutenants have been extremely successful in developing great training programs and aligning the three shifts into one team of professional firefighter/paramedics.






Call Volume

The Fire Department ended 2018 with 4628 emergency calls. This was an increase of nearly 7% from 2017. This increase can be attributed to the development of senior living facilities as well as other mixed use properties. As Libertyville and the surrounding areas grow in population and travel. so will the demand for EMS and Fire services. Libertyville Fire Department, through a strong partnership with the Village and Fire Protection District Administration, are striving to meet and exceed the needs our community and those who visit and travel through the area.





The Fire Department has specialized equipment to manage all types of emergencies. However, over 60% of our emergency calls are medical in nature. Our fleet of vehicles include five advanced life support ambulances with some of the best medical equipment available. This along with rigorous EMS training requirements set by the State of Illinois (IDPH) and the hospital medical system (Advocate Condell EMS) ensures the best service will be given to those in need. Maintaining this service is supported by a detailed quality assurance program. The Fire Department prides itself on providing the best customer service to our customers, regardless of circumstance.


Fire Department Budget

The Fire Department operated on a budget of just under \$8,400,000. There are four divisions within the department that comprise total operations.

Administration budget of \$377,311 funds all administrative expenses including salary and insurance for administrative staff.

Prevention budget of \$177,682 funds fire prevention activities including public education such as Risk Watch, occupant inspection services and other fire bureau activities, as well as salary and insurance for fire prevention staff.

Support Services budget of \$511,138 funds maintenance costs of grounds, buildings, and fleet. Support also funds uniforms and other Firefighter equipment purchases. Emergency Services budget of \$7,333,133 consumes 87% of the total fire department budget. The majority of emergency services funds personnel salaries and insurance. This budget also funds training costs, technical services, and EMS/Fire equipment purchases.

New Purchases

The Department took possession of a Pierce fire engine (E461) in 2018. This vehicle replaced an older fire engine. Safety was one of our main objectives in designing this engine. A center mounted engineer's panel along with features inside the cab ensure our personnel stay safe in route to and on scene of an incident.





A new ambulance joined the fleet replacing one that has served for over ten years. Almost 65% of our calls are medical in nature. Each ambulance is front line for six years and is the primary response vehicle at one of the three fire stations. It then moves to a reserve status for four years. The equipment in these vehicles allow paramedics to give the best possible care to those in need.

New battery operated Hurst extrication tools were purchased to compliment E461. This new technology allows personnel to perform extrication and other specialized response rescues without being tied to a hydraulic line. This advantage greatly increases the use and capabilities of these tools.
